Secondly, less emphasis is placed in this book on the political or military history of Ireland than on general social and cultural aspects. Christians sometimes talk about trying to find the balance between immersing yourself in the world and isolating yourself in a comfy little bubble. Other proponents of Christianity against culture view the Church primarily as an Ultimate Fighter. You can certainly find biblical support for a view that pits the church in the ring against culture. Believers with this mentality are clinging to the biblical principle of waging war against what is evil. They rightly recognize that we must put on the whole armor of God (Ephesians 6:11), fight the good fight of faith (1 Timothy 6:12), resist the devil (James 4:7), and cast down anything that exalts itself against God (2 Corinthians 10:4-5).
