In this seminar we aim to understand American federalism as it was originally articulated and in the context of the confutations that characterized the first decade under the Constitution. Through the discussion of primary sources, with reference to a few secondary materials, we should discover the principal concerns of the founders and the peculiar expressions that shaped the American experience.

The readings and activities for the course are set forth below on a SESSION-by-SESSION schedule. Each participant in the course is individually responsible for fulfilling the requirements of the course as they are set out. Each must affirm to perform all assignments as required and that all work submitted in response to assignments is one's own

Requirements:

1. Attendance on each class session in the course.
2. Advance reading of lesson assignments.
3. Paper: Each class participant must submit an essay, concentrating on some aspect of federalism, the Constitutional Convention or slavery, in relation to the Constitution as articulated at the founding or on some related question arising from discussion. The topic must be discussed with the instructor in advance. The paper must reflect on the express discussions of the seminar. It should not exceed 3,000 words nor be fewer than 1,500 words.

¹ **N.B.** The required texts generally contain extensive bibliography and footnote listings that introduce further primary and secondary reading material. Class participants should pursue judicious selections among these materials for further reading. They may be referenced in the course of discussions.
