Sir John Suckling (10 February 1609 " after May 1641) was an English poet, prominent among those renowned for careless gaiety and wit " the accomplishments of a Cavalier poet. He also invented the card game cribbage. He is best known for his poem "Ballade upon a Wedding". Suckling was born at Whitton, in the parish of Twickenham, Middlesex, and baptized there on 10 February 1609. His father, Sir John Suckling, was Secretary of State under James I and Comptroller of the Household of Charles I. His Sir John Suckling. Born to an old and wealthy Norfolk family, Suckling was educated at Westminster School, Trinity College Cambridge and Grays Inn. He inherited the family wealth at 18 and pursued a military and ambassadorial career overseas which saw him knighted in 1630.
